Our debt burden is low and expected to be zero by the end of this year. A recent workers' compensation study shows a net savings to date of nearly \$5 million. Growth is happening all throughout our county. Warren County continues to rank 3rd in the state in population growth, and 4th in job creation. Working together, the county and local economic development teams brought in new companies as well as significant expansion projects for some of our top employers throughout the county. The Warren County Port Authority has helped finance some of these economic projects, along with a centrally located sports park that will bring an estimated \$54 million in annual revenue via our #1 industry, which is tourism.

In January the County convened a community forum, with the help of the Addiction Policy Forum, a resource provided by the U.S. Dept. Justice, to discuss the opioid problem and begin the process of mapping areas of need. In the coming months we will again call for stakeholders from throughout the county to meet for the purpose of rolling out the mapping and gap analysis done by the Addiction Policy Forum, as well as comprehensive solutions to address specific needs in our communities. Additionally, we want to stop the revolving door at our jail by intercepting those with drug/mental health issues and provide treatment opportunities to help with successful re-entry into the community.
